Public Speaking: Be a Stand-up Comedian

Use the tips below to write your own joke and tell it to your class

TIPS for writing a hilarious joke!

- Decide what kind of joke you want to write. A knock-knock joke? A riddle? A pun? A totally NEW kind of joke that YOU invented?!
- Choose a topic! Some topics might be: school, animals, food, nature, sports, maybe seasons like winter or summer, or holidays like Halloween or Christmas.
- Think of a few jokes you know and like. What's funny about them? Why do they make you laugh?
- Say you decide you want to write a joke about cheetahs. Think of a couple of words to describe cheetahs, like FAST and SPOTS. **Can you think of rhymes for those words?** For example, SPOTS rhymes with POTS. So maybe you can say: "What does a cheetah use to cook dinner? SPOTS AND PANS!
- A lot of good jokes are funny because they give us a feeling of surprise. For example: Knock-knock!

Is there a way you can surprise people with something unexpected popping out of your joke?

TIPS for talking in front of a crowd!

- **Stand tall and smile.** It can be scary to stand in front of a group of people, but you will feel braver if you stand up straight with a beautiful smile.
- **Keep your eyes up.** Try to make eye contact with your classmates while you tell your joke. If that's too hard, look at the wall at the back of the room just above everyone's head.
- Speak up. You worked hard to write your joke, so make sure everyone can hear you. No yelling! But speak loud and clear.
